UCP of Maine SPOTLIGHT

Two of UCP of Maine's home-based services offered to children ages birth through 20 years old are Home and Community Support Services (HCT) and Rehabilitative and Community Support Services (RCS).

HCT services are a Mainecare mental/behavioral health, family and individual treatment service that is delivered in the home. It is a more intensive service than Outpatient therapy. Typically children are referred to HCT when Outpatient hasn't been effective or when stepping down from a higher level of care such as residential, hospitalization or day treatment. HCT treats a broad spectrum of mental health issues such as Trauma, Attention Deficit and Hyperactivity Disorder, Anxiety, Depression, family conflict, Complicated Grief, and Autism Spectrum Disorders. The HCT team includes a licensed clinician and bachelor's level Behavioral Health Specialist. Treatment focuses on such things as psychoeducation, coping/communication skills, behavioral management, parenting, to name a few. Parental participation is a foundational element of the service and improves the outcome and sustains positive changes after the service has ended.

RCS services are a Mainecare rehabilitative service for youth with delays in developmental milestones and functional abilities due to the effects from mental health issues, Autism Spectrum Disorder or medical conditions. Children are qualified through 1 of 3 approved standardized assessments or if they are under 5 years old approval is given with a doctor's note attesting to the medical necessity of this service. RCS services focuses on living skills: hygiene, social skills, problemsolving, community integration, self-care, etc. The RCS BHP works with the parents and the child in the home and community. Caregiver involvement is also a critical element in RCS services.

A couple common misconceptions are 1. RCS is a step down service from HCT. There is no clinician in the RCS service so it may seem less intensive. The real distinction is when there are family system issues and mental health issues that go beyond just addressing the delays and functional abilities. HCT is a more suitable service. 2. That there is less expectation for parental involvement in RCS. The Mainecare rules for parental participation are the same in both programs.

- 4. UCP of Maine BHP's are trained in a technique called Motivational Interviewing. This technique allows BHP's to engage clients in more productive conversations about making changes in their life.
